BOSTON, Saturday, Sept. 30. (7) By a gentleman who left Springfield in the county of Hampshire, on Tuesday evening last, we are made acquainted with the following particulars attending the late infurrection in that county, viz.-Information having been received, that a body of armed men, intended obstructing the bufinels of the Supreme Judicial Court, which was by law to let at Springfield, on Tuesday last; previous thereto, about 120 men from Northampton, and the Springfield company, in arms, sook possession of the Court-House and were joined by others, making in the whole, about 800 armed men, chiefly men of property, well disciplined, officered, and equipped; commanded by Major-General Sheppard-and who were, to a single man, determined, at the rifk of their lives, to support the dignity of government, and protest the Court in the due administration of law and justice-That the Court met on Tuesday, in the Court-House, and that owing to the tumults of the day, and to the want of Jurors, did not open until near night -- That about the fame time, with thole in favour of law and government, the infurgents began to march into town, and on Tuesday amounted to 1000 men, 700 of whom

had arms, but were poorly equipped, and had not one bayonet to three of them; they were led on by one Shays, a deranged officer of the late army, a Capt. Day, and leveral others of the fame stranp; the desperation of whose circumstances had ripered them for scenes of pell mell havock and confusion-That a report having been spread, that the militia were determined the mob should not pals by the Court-Houle, they were to exalperated, that they instantly loaded with ball, and began their march; on which, the militia likewife loaded, the mob, however, thought proper not to advance too near-That although they affected an obstinacy and tenacity worthy a better cause, Gen. Sheppard was confident in his superiority -- and had given them to understand, that his men were determined to support govern. ment, law and justice, and to oppose any who dare endeavour their obstruction-and that unless they (the mob) offended, no offence would be offered them .- That the infurgents had fent in a request to the Court, the object of which was, that no indictments should be found against any of the late rioters, and that none but criminal actions should be tried at this term-That the Court returned for answer, that they should make the law the rule of their conduct -- and adjourned to the following day (Wednelday).

(8) The Courts of Common Pleas, and Seffions, for the County of Elfex, were held at Newbury-Port, on Tuesday last, without interruption.

(9) Yesterday a petition from the town of Dracur, Middlesex County, was read and committed to a Committee of both Houses of the Legislature, the prayer of which is, that Acts may be passed making real and personal property a tender in payment of debts—to annihilate the Courts of Common Pleas, and to have the Eusiness usually done thereby, recognizable before a Justice of the Peace—to abridge the salaries of the several civil officers of government, particularly that of the Chief Magistrate's, which they suggest might be 500l. instead of 1100l.—and to remove the General Court, out of the town of Boston, &c.

of the Senate, and fix on the part of the House, was yesterday raised to take into consideration his Excellency's address, and the papers accom-

panying the same.

On a motion of Mr. Bacon, (member from Stockbridge) in the House of Representatives, yesterday, a committee was also appointed to investigate the several salaries of the civil officers of government, and to report a statement thereof to be laid before the people at large.

(11) On Sunday se'nnight, arrived here from New-York, his Excellency Peter John Van Berkel, Ambassadour from the United States of Holland, to the United States of America.—And on Thursday last a Committee was appointed by the Legislature to draft an address to his Excellency, congratulating him on his arrival in this town:

(12) On Thursday last, the venerable old veteran, Major-General Putnam, passed through this town on his way to Connecticut.

(13) The Courts of Common Pleas and Ganeral Sessions of the Peace, which were by law to have been held at Plymouth, in the county of Plymouth, on Tuesday next, are by a resolve of the General Court, prorogued to the 2d Tuesday in December next.

(14) Setting the want of honesty aside, the greatest grievance really existing among our country brethren is their extreme "ignorance;" a striking instance of which was discovered in a number of the "missed rabble" as Concord, during the late disturbances there—who declared the principal burthen they laboured under, to be the Governour's falary, which they possively declared was SIXTEEN THOUSAND Pounds, per annum. Missepresentations, respecting the salaries of other officers, equally as absurd as the above, are in circulation and find believers in almost every part of the country.

(15) On Thursday last, five of the criminals sentenced at the late Supreme Judicial Court, were publickly whipped at the Market place in this town. The post, on this occasion, was erected in the centre of a wooden cage, which was fixed on wheels, and previously drawn into the square—in the body of which were the criminals—who were separately taken out, and conducted to the top of the cage, where they received their punishment—after which they were drawn therein through the market, and up throstore. State-Street to the gaol.

(16) The Honourable Major General Knoz; Secretary at War, arrived at New-York from this town, on Tuesday seinnight, in good health.

On the aftetnoon of the same day, his Lady was safely delivered of a daughter.
